
It is particularly relevant, as we approach the end of the calendar year, that you are kept up to date with such things as:

Service Improvements

In May 2015 there were outstanding planning enforcement investigations going back as far as 2007.

These cases were mainly complicated and labour intensive and needed a collaborative approach with other local authority departments and partner agencies to solve.

Chris and I decided that we were going to clear the backlog by the end of the year, which would free us to respond quickly to new cases.

I am happy to report that we now have just three cases outstanding from 2014 and a further three have had enforcement notices served, everything else is current to 2015.

We have also introduced an outstanding cases Excel spreadsheet which is available to all planning and building control staff and allows instant understanding of the position of any case at a glance.

The spreadsheet is colour coded to show current status – red, for example, indicates service of an enforcement notice or other action, blue shows cases under consideration by our legal department and pallow shows ongoing investigations or cases awaiting a response from the suspected perpetrator.

One tool we use on a daily basis is the 'Uniform' software. This allows us to update progress, store notes, interrogate planning applications and examine plans.

Going Digital

We have recognized the need to move from a primarily paper based service to a totally digital system of working. This would not only save paper but will allow us to:

- ✓ Reduce the number of multiple site visits
- √ Work remotely
- ✓ Take notes on site
- ✓ Update our customer relationship database instantly
- Produce enforcement letters at the touch of a button
- ✓ Inspect plans on site
- √ Save desk space in the civic centre
- Make use of down time between appointments
- Respond almost immediately to complaints
- ✓ Upload photographs on site

to name but a few benefits.

We have been in consultation with the IT department who have managed to set up a system to allow us to work effectively and efficiently from anywhere in the borough.

I am currently seeking to obtain two laptops for planning enforcement to commence the conversion. I will, of course, update you when we have made the transition.

Additionally...

We are striving to become more pro-active, rather than reactive and to this end Chris has taken on the additional project of dealing with unauthorised satellite dishes in the conservation area.





I have elected to deal with listed building contraventions, particularly within the town centre and the growing number of unauthorised adverts which seem to constantly plague us.

Highways England has arranged a number of public consultation events which are set out below. The first one is on Saturday in Sellindge. The deadline for responses will be midnight on Monday 25 January 2016.

As you will see in the e-mail below, Highways England advise that this consultation is a non-statutory consultation to enable Highways England to obtain a broad range of feedback on general options and in due course it will be followed by a formal consultation on any preferred site that will include greater detail on the design, layout and operation, and any associated, necessary highway works.

We will be in touch again after the consultation document has been published.

Proposed Permanent M20 Lorry Area: Invitation to Stakeholder Briefing

Highways England is proposing to construct a permanent Lorry Area adjacent to the M20. This letter is to tell you about the public consultation which we are launching tomorrow. The consultation will seek your views and we would like to invite you to one of the staffed public information events listed below.

Background to the Proposals

In the 2015 Autumn Statement the Government set funds aside to build a permanent area where lorries can wait their turn to cross the Channel and do not cause disruption to local people or the economy. The Chancellor stated the Government's preference for a site at Stanford but was clear that alternatives would also be considered on an equal basis ahead of making any final decision.

The Government wishes to fully test the case for a permanent lorry area as an alternative solution to Operation Stack, where lorries are temporarily queued on the M20 when there are delays and closures at the Port of Dover and Eurotunnel.
