#### Local Wildlife Sites in Kent

I am writing because Kent Wildlife Trust is responsible for identifying Local Wildlife Sites (formerly known as Sites of Nature Conservation Interest or SNCIs). These are considered of county importance for the wildlife and/or habitats which they hold.

As you are hopefully aware, Kent Wildlife Trust undertakes periodic reviews of Local Wildlife Sites on behalf of the Kent Nature Partnership. These are needed in order to assess the quality of Kent's important wildlife sites and gain an understanding of changes affecting the county's wildlife, ensure that the information we hold on Local Wildlife Sites is as accurate and up to date as possible, and provide a basis for our advisory service to site owners.

Thank you for allowing our surveyor access in 2012. Our review of the above Local Wildlife Site indicated that the site still meets our criteria for Wildlife Site designation. We therefore wish to confirm the site's status as a Local Wildlife Site.

I am writing now as we consult owners of sites before we update citations and confirm land as a Local Wildlife Site (outlined on the enclosed map) or propose boundary changes (hatched on the enclosed map). The enclosed document gives a description and boundary for the Wildlife Site, together with a summary of the reasons for which we believe the site should be confirmed as a Local Wildlife Site. Note that the boundary of the Wildlife Site may only include part of the land in your ownership and may also include land owned by other people.

You should let me know if:

- You have good reason to believe that our description of the site is inaccurate.
- You believe that we have shown the wrong site boundary.
- You believe that the reasons given for designating the site are wrong or misrepresent the wildlife interest of the site.

The decision on whether the land concerned should be confirmed as a Local Wildlife Site will be taken by the Kent Nature Partnership. However, Partnership members will each receive a copy of any response you wish to make to this consultation and will consider this before coming to their decision.

If I do not hear from you within this time, I shall assume you have no comments to make on this matter and I will send a copy of the approved version of the citation in due course, after the next Partnership meeting.

#### REASON FOR DESIGNATION

This site supports a suite of nationally scarce and county scarce plant species, including the county's largest population of green-flowered helleborine <sup>1,2,3</sup> *Epipactis phyllanthes*. The site is also important for invertebrates, which include at least one UK BAP priority species, and several nationally rare and nationally scarce species.

#### RATIONALE FOR SITE BOUNDARY

The site boundary includes the former chalk pit, subsequently used for landfill. The boundary excludes the school and sports pitches. The site adjoins the Swanscombe Skull Site of Special Scientific Interest.

#### DESCRIPTION

This site comprises a complex which includes a gorge through the chalk and grassland over sandy soils.

Although this former chalk pit has been in-filled, an interesting flora occurs on the original grassy margins and an area to the north on dry soils derived partly from Tertiary sands and partly from chalk. Blue fleabane *Erigeron acer*, hare's-foot clover *Trifolium arvense*, knotted clover *T. striatum*, subterranean clover *T. subterraneum*, narrow-leaved bird's-foot-trefoil *Lotus tenuis* and bird's-foot *Ornithopus perpusillus* have been recorded along with spring ephemerals in the sandy areas.

Elsewhere there is a diverse flora, including common bird's-foot-trefoil *Lotus corniculatus* and other common legumes. Of particular interest, is narrow-leaved everlasting-pea *Lathyrus sylvestris* <sup>4</sup> recorded growing in disturbed areas; there are also records of a relict population of yellow vetchling <sup>1,2,5</sup> *Lathyrus aphaca* occurring at the southern end of the site. Both species are scarce in Kent generally, but have been recorded in the Swanscombe area for over one hundred years. Ivy

broomrape <sup>2</sup> Orobanche hederae and round-leaved crane's-bill Geranium rotundifolium <sup>4</sup> have also been recorded. The in-fill dome is less interesting botanically but has been retained within the site as a valuable resource for birds and invertebrates.

Other areas support dense hawthorn *Crataegus monogyna* dominated scrub and, most importantly, there is a deep disused railway cutting on the western edge (Craylands Gorge), which now supports secondary woodland of oak *Quercus robur*, ash *Fraxinus excelsior*, sycamore *Acer pseudoplatanus*, willow *Salix* sp., hawthorn and dogwood *Cornus sanguinea*. Thousands of round-leaved wintergreen <sup>1,2,6,7</sup> *Pyrola rotundifolia* have been recorded at the northern end (20,000 plants were recorded in 2010) together with a large colony of green-flowered helleborine <sup>1,2,3</sup> and ivy broomrape. There are also records of common spotted-orchid *Dactylorhiza fuchsii* from this area. Small calcicolous bryophytes such as the top notchwort liverwort *Leiocolea turbinata* occur on the floor of the cutting.

The site is also important for its invertebrates, which include at least three Red Data Book species, two Notable A species and three Notable B species of hymenoptera. Solitary bee species use the sandy banks and several Notable B species of diptera also occur, as well as dragonflies such as the ruddy darter dragonfly *Sympetrum sanguineum*. Common butterflies and grass moths are widespread and abundant.

The whole site supports a good bird fauna including common warblers, finches, tits, skylark <sup>8,9,10,13</sup>, house martin <sup>11</sup>, swallow <sup>11</sup>, swift <sup>11</sup>, kestrel <sup>11</sup>, green woodpecker <sup>11</sup> and great spotted woodpecker. In winter fieldfare <sup>8,12</sup> and lapwing <sup>8,9,10,13</sup> are common on the open grassland.

Common lizard 9, 12, 13 and slow-worm 9, 12, 13 have been recorded.



I have been referred to you by Liz Dyson, Head of Heritage Conservation at Kent County Council.


